

Straight From The Shoulder

WHEN you scratch your pen across the ballot Friday to select your officers in Student Council, you will want to know exactly for whom and for what you're voting. You don't want to waste your vote on petty job-seeking politicians, who don't give a darn about principle, who only care about the student body or about student democracy as long as they need student help for their own ends.

Folks, meet Paul Borsky, hard-hitting candidate for President of Student Council, who heads the Student Party ticket. Paul says:

"This is the most important election we've ever had. It's not just a political squabble. We're not selecting the world's greatest lover either. Every student's vote means a lot. The real question is, Are we going to have a Student Council that will not be afraid to fight for Student interests, for more NYA jobs, for increased extra-curricular activities, to keep

Led Fight for NYA

Paul came to Brooklyn College from Abe Lincoln High School. He was looking for an education. He couldn't stay in college without his NYA job. When Roosevelt slashed 200 Brooklyn College students off the rolls (to get money for more battleships), Paul rolled up his sleeves, went to work, and helped organize the campus-wide campaign against the cuts which finally (with similiar help from other colleges) won victory, and saved the jobs. For that he's gotten the official endorsement of the NYA Workers & Applicants Club. They know that Paul hasn't merely talked about NYA; he's fought for it. He gets their vote!

Take this peace business too. It isn't just a hobby with Paul. It's serious business. He's 20. He'd go in the first draft — like all of us. "I'd risk my life if I thought a bit of good could come of it, but I'd never lift a finger to prepare us — our student body — for this rotten imperialist war. We should stay out of this dirty mess, and the student government right here on our campus should oppose all this sort of propaganda right here.

"We're not alone either. Since Roosevelt's war speeches this week, thousands of people all over the country have been demanding that a stop be put to this rotten business. Just yesterday thousands of trade unionists tele-

graphed Roosevelt against his plans to get the country into war. The same thing is going on all over the country. A thousand students at Dartmouth College telegraphed their protest. The Chicago Teachers' Union did too. The Faculty of Lafayette College protested. And the flood is just beginning."

Exposes K. F. Platform

He points a finger at the Kingsmen-Fusion ticket: "I think it's a crime the way they dodge the issue. Not a word about staying out of the war. They haven't said a single word about Mr. Gideonse's pro-war speeches."

"We're opposed to doughboys on our campus. What does K. F. say about that?"

Paul Borsky took the lead in organizing the All-College Peace Congress. He was elected its chairman. When the Peace Congress called a spade a spade in its program, and said that the most important issue facing students right here on our campus was to keep out of

the imperialist war, the war-boys and their stooges went to town."

The clique on the Vanguard attacked him. "They didn't like our 'methods," Paul says. "They didn't like it because we refused to play cheap politics and stuck to our platform until it was accepted — these politicians were unhappy because we wouldn't play ball with them. The result was that Brooklyn College led the whole United States in its great Strike on April 19th."
